

TOWN FARM PARK TOWN FARM ROAD

From Portland Road, follow Town Farm Road for .5 miles. Town Farm Park will be on your right.

TOWN FARM PARK SNAPSHO

Hours: Dawn to Dusk

Dogs: Allowed- must be on leash

Bathrooms: Port-a-potty's, seasonally

Trails: Dirt walking trail around complex, and a loop woods trail that connects to Buxton Municipal Complex.

Parking: Large dirt lot, second satellite lot

Playground: Swings, balance beam, climbing structures.

Shelter: Pavilion w/ picnic table

Town Farm Park is also home to baseball, softball, and multi-purpose soccer fields.



Town Farm Park is part of the Buxton Municipal complex property. Approximately ten acres of the original "Town Farm" property has been developed into a park to serve the residents of Buxton. The Town Farm Park Committee was officially formed several years ago to explore the feasibility of establishing more ball fields on Town owned land. The Committee started work with volunteer labor and with help from the National Guard they cleared and leveled a portion of the site at no cost to the Town

Today this Park has been developed into a baseball, softball and multi-purpose fields. Like some of the other Parks in Town, a parameter walking/jogging path, which connects, to the Municipal Complex is available. The Park can be accessed from Town Farm Road, has a large parking lot on site, as well as satellite parking lot

CARROLL PARK GROVEVILLE: CORNER OF HURLIN SMITH AND FLAGGY MEADOW ROADS

Bathrooms: Port-a-potty's, seasonally

Trails: A walking path circles the outside of the park Parking: Perimeter parking on Hurlin Smith Road Playground: Swings, slides, and climbing structures.

Picnic tables are available for use by visitors.

Carroll Park consists of 4.8 acres situated between Flaggy Meadow Road and Hurlin Smith Road in the Groveville section of Buxton. This lovely Town Park contains a baseball diamond, bleacher seating, an equipment storage building, picnic area, off-street parking and a playground. The boy's and girl's softball leagues use the field.

The Trustees have undertaken a massive cleanup of the park by cutting and removing several dead trees from the park to make the entire area safe for visitors. The cleanup was made possible by a donation from the Maine Community Foundation. The playground equipment provided by a grant from the Narragansett Foundation is a tremendous asset to the Park and is used year round.

This lovely piece of property was used as a park for many years before Harold Carroll purchased it in 1973 and subsequently given to the town. Volunteers and local residents maintain the park. Many local businesses and town residents have donated their time and energy to make this Park what it is today.





PLEASANT POINT PARK SIMPSON ROAD, BUXTON MAINE Park Trustees: Donna Beal, David Field, Julie Gamelson

Originally called the "Cyrus Woodman Reservation" Pleasant Point Park was placed in a trust by the Woodman family. 1923: the Park was given to Appalachian Mountain Club by Mary Woodman.

1945: the AMC gave the Park to the State of Maine. .959: the Town of Buxton received a letter from the State Park Commission saying that they would not entertain the idea of ransferring ownership of (Pleasant Point Park) because of the State's plan to develop the property. However, the plans were not carried out due to the Class "D" (unsuitable for public recreation due to the water quality of the Saco River adjacent to Pleasant Point Park at the time.)

1960: the Buxton Selectmen proposed a lease agreement wit the State of Maine Park Commission. At their annual eeting, the townspeople voted it down, again because of the Class "D" designation.

1971: the Town of Buxton entered a 5 year renewable license with the State to use the land with some covenants in place.



Hours: 7 AM-8 PM Parking: Large dirt before main entrance

Recreation: Hand-carry boat launch, swimming (at your own

risk), and hiking trails.

Picnic tables and trash bins are available for visitor use.

Outdoor Summer Program Logistics

- Drinking water: Shuttled in daily
- Structures: EZ-Ups, tables, benches, and handwashing stations were set up and broken down each day
- Sanitization: Port-A-Potty's, gross motor equipment, playground equipment, games, and all above mentioned structures were sanitized each morning, and after each use. Rainy days were used as deep cleaning opportunities.

COVID-19 Health and Safety Protocols- Highlights

PPE: Face masks were used when social distancing was not possible - Exceptions:

- child was engaged in gross motor activity involving heavy breathing
- child was participating in an activity that was 6 feet away from other children
- meal time (Children were separated while eating)

Wellness Checks: All staff and children completed a Wellness Check upon arrival, which included checking for symptoms, asking about travel history, and taking a temperature using a touchless thermometer.

Handwashing and Sanitization: A hand washing station was set up each day to use at the bathrooms. Hand sanitizer was located at each camp, on tables, and at check-in.

Cross Contamination: Camps were separated into small cohorts and were scheduled to participate in activities away from other camps.

Consistent Indoor Space

The Outdoor Summer Program either cancelled, or ended the day early, due to thunderstorms or extreme heat.

Transportation

Having a small bus to be able to transport groups of children to other Buxton parks would have increased the quality of the program.

- Access to local swimming opportunities
- Change of scenery for the camps (Variety of playgrounds and park play.)
- Increase exposure of all Buxton's parks
- Small, free field trips (Partner with local library's, Buxton farms, and local historical landmarks)
